


# Incredible Edibles

Don and I have attended a couple of seed swaps that were arranged by a group called Incredible Edibles but neither of us had really looked into the group itself. I was prompted to find out more when a friend of mine sent me a link to a talk given by Pam Warhurst who founded the group in Todmorden. The talk is entitled – How we can eat our landscapes. This down to earth, inspirational lady, together with a friend, decided to plant abandoned patches of land with vegetables, herbs and fruit and encouraged locals to pick them.

In Todmorden there are vegetables growing outside the health centre, the police station, along the tow path and even in the cemetery. These growing spaces led to conversations that encouraged people to see that small actions can help people live happy and healthy lives.

It's motto is – If you Eat you're In and by 2016 there were 200 groups in the UK and 600 globally. My daughter spotted some whilst in Canada last summer and in Swindon alone there are growing beds at the Central Community Centre on Emlyn Square and in West Swindon there are beds in Woollaton Close, Bosham Close, Godolphon Close, Freshbrook Centre and Freshbrook Church. There is another planned for Toothill Church.

In 2017 the Big Lottery Fund became involved to help communities to develop and learn from shared learning.

As well as a seed swap event, this year on 23rd February, the Swindon group also holds a plant swap and a produce swap incorporating the whole growing season.

## Pickards Field Member's shop

The shop will re-open at 10 a.m. on Saturday, 23<sup>rd</sup> February and will then be open from 10 a.m. until 12 noon on every Saturday, Sunday and Monday through until Monday, 28<sup>th</sup> October. I am writing this in mid January and normally I have received all our suppliers' catalogues and price lists by now but, to date, the only catalogue I have received is from Franchi Seeds of Italy. While not increasing their prices they've reduced the discount we get as well as recently ending the "sale or return" agreement we have enjoyed for many years. As a result, members who visited the shop last October will know that we were selling off time-expired packets at less than cost. This was to reduce our losses now we can no longer send them back for a refund. It's possible that we will no longer be able to stock Franchi seeds, but in the meantime I intend to increase our price by 20 pence per packet to cover the risk we now have to carry. Nevertheless they will still be about one-fifth below the full retail price.

It's possible that the other catalogues are held back because of the uncertainty surrounding BREXIT although this shouldn't affect either Oak Tree Products or Durstons, both of whom are trading wholly in "home grown" commodities. In any event SALGA will honour the pre-season prices of goods already ordered by members, whether or not we have to increase the prices we charge in the future.

I now want to talk about the management of the shop. For many years while Jim Maskelyn was treasurer, the shop was run by another volunteer. Jim only took over the dual role when Olive Warman stepped down from running the shop. In fact, it's not ideal for one person to hold both positions. It makes it more difficult to find a replacement and also weakens the 'internal check' structure which provides for at least two people to approve each financial transaction. Actually I made it plain that I didn't want to run the shop when I took over the treasurer's role in 2009. Non-the-less that's exactly what happened and ten years later nothing has changed.

Actually a lot has changed. From a position of a fund balance of about £4,000, a shop building with porous walls and four dilapidated storage units, we have progressed to current assets of about £12,000 plus a renovated shop building and four new storage sheds. SALGA is now also a registered charity and we have a lease agreement for our site at Pickards Field rather than just squatting on the land as we did in the past. None of this could have been achieved without the band of volunteers who turn up from time to time to help unload stock deliveries and especially without the regular helpers who run the shop every Saturday, Sunday and Monday for eight months of the year.

Although this sounds onerous, all the regular shop helpers seem to enjoy themselves and express regret when circumstances force them to stand down. Currently we would like to add an additional young(ish) volunteer to the team of weekend helpers, someone who is still able to lift a 25 kilo bag.

Thinking a bit more long-term, the Association really should be looking for my replacement. Dividing the roles as they were all those years ago would make it less daunting. A volunteer to manage the shop could then be the first step. Ideally it needs to be someone with a computer and a basic knowledge of spreadsheets although that's not essential because I can continue to keep the stock sheets as part of the financial records. If someone **does** come forward then we can work towards an orderly take-over during 2019. That would leave me with the treasurer's role.

We're fast approaching the tenth anniversary of SALGA becoming a registered charity and the Charity Commission hold the view that ten years is the maximum that chairs, secretaries and treasurers of charities should serve before relinquishing their posts. So we're likely soon to be getting a "nudge" from their office in Bootle to replace me. In the absence of any volunteers I shall of course continue as before, but then we'll be moving towards a "cliff edge", to use some BREXIT jargon. At worse it could involve my daughter down-loading my computer records on to a memory stick for my successor and handing over half-a-dozen box files.

# Another Grand Day Out

A visit to Kew Gardens is being arranged for **Thursday, October 10<sup>th</sup> 2019**.

Although it will be approaching autumn there will still be plenty to do and see in this three hundred acre garden.

This year there is a special exhibition, called “**Reflections on Nature**” showing the work of Dale Chihuly. He is the world’s most celebrated contemporary glass artist and his pieces will be placed around the gardens and in the famous glass houses.

A glass sculpture will hang in the large space of the newly restored **Temperate House**. This is the largest Victorian glass house in the world and it is now fully restored after five years’ work. The Pagoda can be seen (from the outside) as it too has been restored.

There is plenty to see from coloured grasses and their seed heads, any second flowering in the borders and a bonsai house, orchids and cactus inside.

For plants and art together there is the **Marianne North Gallery** showing the pictures by a Victorian lady, who travelled the world to paint plants in their own surroundings.

Then, there is the **Hive**, a multisensory structure that represents the activity of the bees in the surrounding wild flower meadows.

As there is so much to see, **the Kew Explorer**, might be a welcome way to get to different sites. There is a commentary as the land train makes its way clockwise around the grounds where you can “hop on or off” at any of the seven stopping places.

The cost will be **£35 per person**, which covers the coach journey, party rate admission to Kew and use of the Explorer. A list of interested people will be started as soon as this information is available at meetings and in the newsletter.

# Annual Horticultural Show

By tradition SALGA's annual show always takes place on the first Saturday in September, which this year falls on the 7<sup>th</sup>. Originally this was because there were so many local shows throughout the season that the organisers had to avoid clashing with one another. Sadly now, several of the events have been discontinued. Among the competitors we see many of the same faces each year but always fewer new faces than we would like. Everyone is welcome to come to see the exhibits and admission is free, but to compete you have to be a member of SALGA. Thus "professional competitors" who take their produce from show to show are generally excluded. They probably would not be attracted in any event because the money prizes awarded are quite nominal.

About four of our regular exhibitors are members who grow to show while the remainder grow to eat, (or in the case of flowers, grow to please), so the field really is wide open. The first time I came to the show was just to see the exhibits, but I realised I had vegetables in my garden that were just as good as some that had won a first prize. So from then on I became a regular competitor. One of the classes I always entered was three onions grown from sets, not exceeding 250 grams. These then always ended up adorning the altar for Harvest Festival at the now defunct Butterworth Methodist Church. Harvest festivals are mostly about tinned food these days which then goes to food banks, but you need some fresh produce to remind the congregation that it's a service of thanksgiving for the bounty of the earth.

The show also includes classes for cooking, preserves, wine, handicrafts, childrens' entries and group entries. So there's something for everyone.

So why not give it a go this year? Entry forms need to be in by Sunday, 1<sup>st</sup> September and can be posted or handed in at Pickards Field shop, where the volunteers on duty will be pleased to guide newcomers through the process. Then just turn up with your entries at Gorse Hill Community Centre on the morning of Saturday, 7<sup>th</sup> September.

# Seed Scheme

Thank you to everyone who collected their seed catalogue from the SALGA shop and placed an order with Kings seeds this year. Most of the catalogues reserved for people who had ordered in previous years or were new members, were collected as requested with all spares also being given out. A grand total of £4101 of orders was sent to Kings which earned SALGA a commission of £205. Orders were actually around the same value as last year which is interesting as the number of people placing orders was also the same as last year, although the people who placed those orders were considerably different.

It is slightly confusing as 210 catalogues were available in the shop for people to collect including around 60 spares. All of these were claimed. However we only received 116 orders which presumably means that 94 catalogues were sent to recycling. As each catalogue is quite costly to produce, it seems such a shame that so many were unnecessary. Denis Matthews does try to keep his list up-to-date of those who wish to receive a catalogue each year, so your help to do this is greatly appreciated.

I enjoyed reading the notes some of you included with your order and thank you to those who sent their order in early so that I didn't have a huge quantity near the end of November to be checked.

By the time you read this, many of you will have starting sowing. Let's hope this year proves to be a really good growing year. Perhaps some of you will show the results of your efforts at our Show due to be held 7<sup>th</sup> September 2019 at Gorse Hill Community Centre. Or just come a long, see what everyone else has produced and introduce yourself to me. It's always good to be able to put a face to a name.

Seed catalogues will again be available from next October. Those of you who have ordered in 2018 will automatically be allocated a catalogue. ## Camellias: The Rose of Winter



This is the story of our three camellias. It's always the highlight of spring for us when they bloom. Last year, these plants had very different tales to tell.

The first to flower is always the stocky single one. He may only have single flowers, but he carries so many blooms there is no fault in that. In fact, he's the old fellow of the garden. Here, he is planted in a sheltered bed. This is his second garden and he has been here for 38 years and he has a history. He cost Granddad Cooke six pence in Woolworths in 1947. Everything in Woolworths was six pence in those days. It was quite an investment.

The Camellia plant is not new to this country as records show it was here in 1745. Then, seen as fragile plants they were nurtured in glasshouses but it was no good. They died because it was too hot and humid. They like to be cool and are rarely killed by cold. They like cool dry winters and warm wet summers.

The second camellia we have we have named Diana. It's a posh double, which arrived in a big tub as a present from our sister. We can never get the p.h. level right, 5.5 – 6.5 is required. Pine bark or needles as mulch are recommended. We found that advice to water it well and regularly in early autumn ensures the buds are set for the coming year. Rain water, being slightly acid is best. There are fewer but bigger double blooms than on Grandad. "Diana" has varied flowering over the years but she has always made some kind of appearance.

And for the third plant: that was a sad ending as it was in the wrong place at the wrong time. It wasn't those cold nights and clear skies though, it was the rapid thawing in the early morning sunlight. Worse it was facing east; a no- no. So we have to start again on a new one. That's gardening for you!

This year, the first pink Camelia was photographed at Kew on 14<sup>th</sup> January 2019. Let's hope you watered your own plants enough in the summer heatwave. We hope we did too, so we can look forward to seeing our own Roses of Winter.

# Potato Pithivier

2 packs of ready rolled puff pastry

400g white potatoes

4 sprigs of thyme

250g cheese (mixture of cheddar and Emmental) or any hard cheese

1 small onion

Salt and pepper

1 egg

Remove puff pastry from fridge 30 minutes before cooking.

Peel and thinly slice the potatoes and boil for 10 minutes with 1 sprig of thyme in the water. Drain the potatoes and leave to cool.

Grate the cheese, slice the onion and finely chop the remaining thyme.

Once the potatoes have cooled, roll out one of the packs of puff pastry onto a baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Using a large plate as a template cut round to create a large circle. Prick the bottom all over with a fork.

Start to layer the pithivier filling leaving a 1cm rim around the outside - a thin layer of the potatoes, pinch of seasoning followed by some onion and chopped thyme, then a generous handful of the grated cheese. Start a new layer with the potatoes and carry on until you have used all the ingredients.

Place the other pack of puff pastry on a floured chopping board and with a slightly larger plate, cut out the top circle (this needs to be slightly bigger to stretch and cover the filling).

Beat the egg and brush the rim of the pastry. Place the top circle over the filling and use your thumbs to create a seal. Follow this by pressing round the edges with a fork to ensure no leakage.

Decorate the pithivier by taking a sharp knife and starting in the middle lightly score down the sides in a semi-circle pattern.

Place the pithivier in the fridge to rest for 30 minutes and pre-heat the oven to 190 °C. After resting, remove from the fridge and brush with the remaining egg. Place in the oven for 45 minutes or until golden brown.
